





<u>100 Dragons Named Broccoli</u> by David LaRochelle, illustrated by Lain Cho





<u>Big</u> by Vashti Harrison





Every Dreaming Creature by Brendan Wenzel





<u>How to Count to 1</u>





<u>I Really, Really Love You So</u> by Karl Newson, illustrated by Duncan Beedie


<u>Once Upon a Book by Grace Lin & Kate Messner</u>





<u>The Only Way to Make Bread</u> by Cristina Quintero, illustrated by Sarah Gonzales




<u>Ramen for Everyone</u> by Patricia Tanumihardja, illustrated by Shiho Pate





<u>Sometimes It's Nice to Be Alone</u> by Amy Hest, illustrated by Philip Stead





<u>The Tree and the River</u> by Aaron Becker





A Unicorn, a Dinosaur, and a Shark Walk into a Book by Jonathan Fenske


Watch Out for the Lion! by Brooke Hartman, illustrated by Anna Süßbauer




<u>You Are a Story</u> by Bob Raczka, illustrated by Kristen and Kevin Howdeshell
